**Good news for those who lost a house to taxes**

For those who lost their house or building because of a tax foreclosure in Wayne County, there is relief coming your way.

That's the result of a recent court ruling that now provides a path for former owners to receive compensation from the sale of tax foreclosed properties.

Specifically, the Michigan Supreme Court ruled that former property owners and interest holders may be entitled to receive money left over after their foreclosed properties were sold at auction.

Since then, the Wayne County Treasurer's Office has begun issuing payments to former owners and interest holders – whose claims have been approved by the Wayne County Circuit Court.

So far, more than \$3.8 million has already been returned to eligible claimants in Wayne County.

The Treasurer's Office is making sure people know they might be eligible to receive remaining proceeds. The office carried out an extensive informational campaign designed to reach former property owners and interest holders who may be qualified to file a claim.

"This is money that belongs to the people," said Wayne County Treasurer Eric R. Sabree in a press release. "When someone is legally entitled to proceeds from the sale of tax foreclosed property, we believe it's our responsibility to inform people that those dollars are available and can be returned to them."

The Treasurer's Office stresses that its top priority is preventing foreclosure in the first place. Through payment plans, tax assistance programs, and commu-

# What's in store for 2026? Let's take a look

Just why, exactly, is a mystery to us, considering how much the club has done for the stadium and city.

And, speaking of the Board of Education, there are three board members up for re-election this year, and our crystal ball says that two of them won't run again.

Last year, we wondered when – and if – then-Mayor Amer Ghalib would get a job with President Trump's administration.

Ghalib's original job

wish with the administration was to be ambassador to Kuwait, but that fell flat during his Senate confirmation hearing – largely due to his past comments and activity on social media.

He has been saying, more or less, that any day an announcement would be made about his new job.

We were waiting. And... waiting. Annnnnn waiting.

It seemed to us, as more time went by, that just maybe that ship had sailed.

But, surprise! As it turned out Ghalib, indeed, landed a job with the Trump administration, as a consultant to AmeriCorps. This comes at a time, however, when the approval of the Trump administration on the president's handling of just about everything is at an all-time low.

For the past few years, city officials lamented the loss of revenue from the Wayne County jail located in Hamtramck, which amounted to \$1.4 million a year for the city.

That's no chump change.

Over the last several months, we heard potential good news, from sources, that the county is ready to reopen the jail and renew the revenue flow to the city.

As it turned out, the county will resume payments to the city for use of the jail site.

The only problem? It's likely going to be about half the income every year, versus what used to be received.

**Former mayor announces new job**

Former mayor Amer Ghalib is moving on to a new job.

As he has predicted for the past few months, Ghalib is now working for President Trump's administration, for the federal agency AmeriCorps, where he will hold the title of Senior Consultant for Strategic Partnerships.

Ghalib was initially nominated by Trump to be ambassador to Kuwait, but that nomination hit a roadblock at a confirmation hearing with the U.S. Senate Foreign Relations Committee last October.

That original nomination appeared to be a reward for Ghalib's endorsement of Trump in the 2024 presidential election. Ghalib was credited with influencing other Arab and Muslim voters in the Detroit area to switch from supporting Democrats to Republicans.

But, during his confirmation, both Republican and Democratic senators took issue with Ghalib's past comments and social media activity that they considered to be antisemitic.

Ultimately, the Senate Committee never even took up a vote on Ghalib, which prevented him from getting the ambassador job.

Here's what Ghalib has to say about his new role on his Facebook page in an apparent rough translation from Arabic to English:

"It is official, I took the constitutional oath today, and discharged my duties in office.

"On this occasion, I extend my sincere thanks and appreciation to President Donald Trump for trusting me, and entrusting me with this position within his administration and leadership, through which I can work with integrity to serve the interests of American citizens first, without any opposition to the interests of other countries."

"This role also allows me to develop partnerships with local communities and civic organizations across the country, through my work at AmeriCorps, to serve citizens in multiple areas including health, education, housing and public safety, and foster a culture of engagement in various fields of public service.

"I had asked the Pre-

What's curious, though, is the timing of the announcement. Hamtramck has brand new political leadership, just a few weeks old. Why is there an announcement now? Is it that this change in leadership was the key?

We have a sneaking suspicion the change of heart is no coincidence.

Speaking of leadership, is there growing pressure to bring in a Yemeni-American as city manager?

So far, placing Yemeni-Americans in the roles of deputy city manager and police chief hasn't panned out. Is the third time the charm?

There might be an announcement coming in the next few weeks.

Last year, we also noted that many in Hamtramck's conservative

Muslim population had defected from the Democratic Party to the Republican Party.

Now, with Trump's travel ban in effect for over a dozen Muslim-majority countries – including Yemen and Bangladesh, where many in the city immigrated from – will those same voters do a U-turn and go back to the Dems in the midterm elections this coming November?

We think that's a possibility – especially considering that ICE is rounding up people solely because they look foreign. ICE agents are already prowling Detroit and the suburbs.

Our guess is, Hamtramck will be getting our own unwanted visits.

Just remember, a couple thousand of the city's immigrants voted for this.

Another easy prediction: this year, Veterans Park will realize further rebirth, this time in the form of new restrooms being installed. The roads and parking lot around the stadium have already been repaved.

Politically-speaking, Hamtramck often holds many secrets.

And, just as often, they end up being mere rumors that amount to nothing.

Having said that, recently, City Councilmember Mohammed Hassan posted something pretty intriguing on his Facebook page, in which he threatened to post a video – or whatever you call it these days – of a person (or persons) sitting at a dining table with a bunch of absentee ballots back in 2021.

Hmmm ... Who could this person or persons be?

We are taking this with the proverbial (giant) grain of salt, considering the blustery nature of Councilman Hassan. But, if such a video does, in fact, get released, it could damage the reputations of one or two current or former elected officials.

And, speaking of Councilmember Hassan (who is now the mayor pro tem of the city), he is, himself, facing felony

election fraud charges. His court date is set for April in Wayne County Circuit Court.

We've been told that the evidence against him hinges on a sole witness. Will this witness show up? Will they testify truthfully?

To quote the character "The Dude" in the movie "The Big Lebowski": "Expect lots of ins, outs, and what-have-yous."

### Will city taxpayers be hit with a hefty bill?

Hamtramck, like a number of other communities, is about to get screwed by Republican state legislators.

That's because they went to court to block roughly \$5 million that had been earmarked about a year ago to fund several projects here in town, including purchasing a new fire truck that is already under construction.

All together, \$645 million is at stake for a number of various projects in communities throughout the state.

The legislators claim the funding is unconstitutional, according to

some obscure rule in controlling state funding.

Fortunately, the state has already funneled some of this money to Hamtramck, but a question lingers whether communities will be forced to pay back money already spent.

That will be financially devastating to Hamtramck, which, like other communities, was selected because we are a community where many people are surviving on poverty wages.

We are also a city with aging infrastructure, and limited financial resources.

We understand that legislators want to be fiscally responsible, but subjecting communities to footing the bills for millions in improvements that were already promised is anything but responsible.

And, if Hamtramck is socked with a bill to pay back the funding, you can bet it will be property owners – homeowners – who will be forced to pay for it, through a court-ordered tax.

Legislators need to know that they are playing with their fellow citizens' financial security.

## Mayor moves quick to begin city rebranding effort

In a move that surprised a number of residents, newly-elected mayor Adam Alharbi introduced new city logo designs.

And this was done in the first few weeks since Alharbi became mayor.

The immediate reaction on social media, however, was a big thumbs-down.

"There is nothing wrong with the current logo. More distractions and wasting taxpayer money," said Diane Elizabeth.

The initial designs offered by Alharbi featured an eagle motif that, for some, conjured up similar designs used by a certain 1930s German fascist party.

"Looks awfully WWII with Nazi undertones to

me," said Lynn Blasey.

The most frequent criticism was that the designs looked computer generated.

"Both of these are AI generated slop and it's frankly disappointing and disrespectful to the artist community of Hamtramck which the city is known for having an amazing and vibrant artist community. There's a right way and wrong way to do things and this definitely falls into the wrong way," said Gracie Olivero.

Well, you get the drift – and so did Alharbi, who agreed to go back to the drawing board.

"You spoke, and we listened!" he said on Facebook. "We've taken your feedback from the pre-

vious round to refine our city logo. Hamtramck is a different city than it was 100 years ago, and we want a brand that reflects 'The World in Two Square Miles' as we know it today."

So, Alharbi handed off the project to the Hamtramck Arts & Culture Commission.

In the meantime, Alharbi unveiled a new round of designs.

And once again, the critics weren't impressed.

"As a professional graphic designer with years of experience, I believe the previous Hamtramck city logo was far stronger," said Bodrul Ahmen. "The new design appears rushed and lacks

## Odds & Ends

**Winter brings unwanted ICE ...** By now, we've all seen, heard or read about the bullying and even deadly tactics employed by agents – many of them newly hired and, apparently, poorly trained – from Immigration and Customs Enforcement, or ICE, as well as Border Patrol and the National Guard.

Immigration legal experts advise the following if you are confronted by ICE agents:

- You do not have to open the door. If you do, stay calm – you have rights.

- Ask what or who they are there for (and ask for an interpreter if you need one).

- If they ask to enter, ask if they have a warrant signed by a judge and, if so, ask to see it (through a window, or slipped under the door).

- If they do not have a warrant signed by a judge, you may refuse to let them in. Ask them to leave any information at your door.

- If they force their way into your home, do not resist. Tell everyone in the residence to remain silent.

- If you are arrested, you have the right to remain silent. Do not sign anything until you speak with a lawyer.

While these tips may not fully protect you, you can also try filming the incident with your phone. Again, remain calm. Keep insisting on communicating with a legal representative until you are granted such. Go over details; you may need to testify in court, and coming to a clear agreement about what exactly happened can be very important if it comes to that point.

**I spy on you? ...** Folks are sounding the alarm that households with Ring Doorbell cameras may find out the information they collect could be used against you.

How's that?

According to various reports, it's been said that there are cases of Ring devices being hooked up with the surveillance company Flock, which police departments, including Hamtramck, use for license plate reading to

catch wanted criminals.

The concern is that information gathered by these two devices will be funneled to ICE for their efforts to catch suspected illegal aliens.

Hamtramck is long known for being a town populated mostly by immigrants – many newly or recently arrived.

If that sounds straight out of Big Brother science fiction, well, it may not be fiction anymore.

However, Ring is owned by Amazon, and that company's Jeff Bezo denies that there is any data sharing.

Hmmmm.

That sounds reassuring, right?

Watch this space for future updates.

**Hot cars ...** According to a new and thorough-looking survey by a website called Compare the Market, data on car thefts puts Michigan at number 16 per capita in the U.S. – and that's nothing to burn rubber over.

And while Michigan's rate of 265 thefts per 100,000 residents pales in comparison with Colorado's abysmal 777-per-100K figure, it's still nowhere near New Hampshire's pristine 67-per-100K number either.

Michigan is also a bit quirky in that it is only state in the union where the preferred target vehicle is the Jeep Grand Cherokee.

In 37 other states, it is either the unspecified "Chevrolet Pickup" (19) or "Ford Pickup" (18). Also in the mix: the Honda Accord (7), Hyundai Elantra (4), Toyota Camry (1) and Honda CR-V (1).

If you're either astute at math, OCD, or bored, and added that all up and realized it came out to 51 states, that's because the District of Columbia was entered separately as its own entry.

The survey also noted the second- and third-most targeted makes/models, and for Michigan, they were the Dodge Charger and the Chrysler 300 Series vehicles.

Interestingly, neither the Chevy nor the Ford Pickups, so prevalent across much of the nation to be earmarked

for swiping, didn't even crack the state's top three.

Only 10 other states were also able to say that as well, all of them either Midwest/Northern (Illinois, Ohio, Wisconsin) or Eastern Seaboard (D.C., Maryland, Connecticut, Rhode Island, Pennsylvania, New York, Massachusetts).

**More on car thefts ...**We've talked about what's getting swiped, but there's also another in-depth analysis from Compare the Market just out called "The Five Riskiest Places to Park in Michigan."

A five-year-long analysis examining 116,677 Michigan car thefts, the study found that about 2 out of every 5 thefts occur at home, while more than three in five happen when away.

In regard to this ratio, Michigan is similar to much of the rest of the nation.

Two types of areas account for more than four-fifths of the "away" thefts: A vehicle getting taken from a public street, alley, freeway etc., 45 percent, and the car getting taken from a parking garage or drop off / ride share lot, 36 percent.

How to help prevent this?

Good old common sense: park where there are a lot of people, and it's well-lit and, preferably, monitored by a security person; lock your doors and windows and leave nothing of value visible; consider anti-theft devices, such as steering wheel locks or alarm systems.

Many modern vehicles come with the latter as standard equipment, but it could be argued that people are so used to car alarms going off that they don't react much anymore.

And, in this cold weather, be especially careful starting your vehicle remotely, even if you are watching it closely; most car thieves are opportunistic, and look to strike quickly for the easy pickings.

# For pets, owners are told to beware of exposure to bitter cold

Brrrrrr ... It's been cold out there.

Dangerously cold. It's been advised to minimize your outdoor exposure during this severe arctic blast.

And that applies to pets as well – especially to anyone who keeps their pet dog outside, which is wrong no matter the season.

If you see a pet dog sitting outside in the cold for a prolonged period in your neighborhood, there is a city ordinance that requires pets to be brought indoors.

When it comes to what the city calls "extreme weather," the law says:

"No animal shall be left outside and unattended, regardless of access to an outdoor shelter, during any period in which a severe weather advisory or warning has been issued for the area by the National Weather Service, or if the temperature is below 43 degrees Fahrenheit or above 90 degrees Fahrenheit.

"This includes but is not limited to an animal in a security fenced-in yard, an animal in a kennel, or an animal tethered. This

section does not apply to feral or community cats."

So far, the weather forecast calls for frigid temperatures below 20 degrees for the next several days.

If you do see a pet outside for long periods, you are asked to call the police department at 911.

The animal rights organization PETA (People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals) estimates that, so far in the 2025-2026 winter season, 56 pet dogs have died from the cold across the U.S.
