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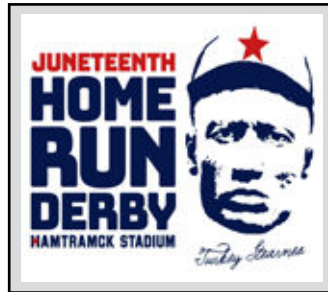

Juneteenth celebrations in town

This weekend, Hamtramck will be busting out all over with celebrations related to Juneteenth.

Juneteenth is America's newest federal holiday, which was signed into law by President Biden just five years back, in 2021. It celebrates Black emancipation during the 1860s, and the continuing movement toward full Black equality.

Today (Friday June 19), things kick off at 11 a.m. with a fifth annual celebration at Hamtramck Stadium, co-sponsored and created by the Friends of Historic Hamtramck Stadium and the Hamtramck Parks Conservancy.

There will be a keynote address by Dorian Hairston and a tribute to Ron "Schoolboy" Teasley at that time.

Dorian Hairston is a published "Afrilachian" poet from Lexington, Kentucky.

Ron "Schoolboy" Teasley was a Negro League player who passed away back in February, at age 99.

At noon, it's "batter up" time with a Home Run Derby, and, after that, at 1:30 p.m., winners of the Turkey Stearnes Foundation's Multidisciplinary Art Contest will be announced. Scholarships will be awarded.

Lastly, there will be a 2 p.m. ball game: The Negro Leagues Prep Star Classic, this year between Team Stearnes and Team Teasley.

No word on bad weather contingencies, so keep your fingers crossed they can get it all in okay.

And then tomorrow, Saturday, June 20, there will be another celebration at Veterans Park, beginning at 10 a.m. From there, a car and bus caravan will take those willing on to Sarah Garrett Park, where, at 10:45, participants will march back on down to Veterans Park, a walk of just under a mile and a half.

Then, once all are back at Veterans Park, activities include "dynamic speakers," live music

Veterans honor Flag Day with a special commemoration

Burning an American flag on Flag Day may seem like an odd way to celebrate Old Glory.

But on Sunday, which was Flag Day, veterans and friends at P.L.A.V. Post 6 were burning a flag not as an act of protest.

It was called a "retirement" of old and soiled American flags, and burning them in this context and manner is considered the proper way to dispose of them. The post burned just one flag outside of its post at Evaline and McDougall, and the dozen of old flags collected will be given to a flag company for further disposal.

As the lone flag burned, Post Commander Mark Widzinski gave a short speech.

Here, in part, is what he had to say:

"Today, June 14, commemorates that day in 1777 that the U.S. government approved the design for the first flag. The colors red, white, and blue were selected with meaning – red for courage, white for purity of ideals, and blue for the unbreakable union of our states.

"The flag stands as a powerful symbol of our unity, pride and shared values. We honor the flag for the values it stands for – life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. ...

"Today is also the day that we can respectfully destroy flags that are deteriorated and no longer fit for display. In some situations, the burning of a

flag is shown for dissatisfaction of our country over a given policy.

"If done correctly, the burning of a flag is proper retirement. This ceremony is NOT a political statement. We honor our flag and country by placing it in school classrooms and in public places.

"And we destroy unserviceable flags in a dignified ceremony that we conduct today. Some may say that patriotism and the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag are out of style. No one in the VFW or P.L.A.V. thinks that way. The flag stands for freedom that no one can take away.

"Our flag is the most highly recognized and, I believe, respected symbol on earth – and in outer space, with Old Glory having been planted on the moon. And, in the not-too-distant future, the flag will be planted on Mars. NASA has promised that planting of the flag on Mars will be beamed back to earth. I hope we are all around to see it. ...

"The flag almost fell at Gettysburg, it took a direct hit at

Mayor files lawsuit to undo CM firing

As expected, the saga of the firing of City Manager Adel Al-Adlani isn't over.

On Monday, Mayor Adam Alharbi, through his attorney Nabih Ayad, filed a restraining order in Wayne County Circuit Court to reverse the city council's decision.

Alharbi, who accused councilmembers of violating the charter for the way the city manager was fired, is asking for an emergency ruling, which, as of press time, the court has not yet provided.

The mayor says the resolution was improper because it was added onto last week's council agenda right as the meeting started, as opposed to submitting it earlier for the public to be properly made aware of it.

"The charter is our city constitution that we must follow," Alharbi said, at a press conference he held on Monday afternoon in front of city hall. "We cannot have elected officials not follow the charter."

Councilmember Mohammed Hassan has been regularly adding items onto the agenda as council meetings start, and Alharbi said he has abused that right. He said the charter only allows items to be added on an agenda at the last minute that are of an emergency nature or are time sensitive.

What it comes down to is the definition of an emergency.

Alharbi's attorney, Nabih Ayad, was also at the press conference and repeatedly referred to Hassan, without naming him, as someone facing "multiple" felony charges.

Ayad also criticized the council's action saying, "This isn't the Wild West. They need to understand there are rules and regulations."

Hassan is facing three felony election fraud charges, and is slated for a trial in Wayne County Circuit Court on June 29.

He is being charged with:

- Forging a voter's signature on an absentee ballot application
- Forgery
- Making a false statement on an application for an absentee ballot

In the meantime, that left City Attorney Odey Merouh in the awkward position of filing a response defending the city council's action and oppo-

sing the mayor.

In a statement he sent to The Review, Meroueh said the mayor's lawsuit is flawed.

"The complaint has serious errors and inconsistencies that illustrate the lack of merit within," Meroueh said. "It skips the entire count, quotes from an employment contract it does not attach, mischaracterizes council procedural rules as charter provisions, and cites as authority a court of appeals decision that it acknowledges was reversed by the Michigan Supreme Court. We are confident in the city's position."

Mayor Alharbi championed the hiring of Al-Adlani, although it appears, through email conversations between him and the city's human resources director, that he attempted to boost Al-Adlani over other candidates.

City Manager Al-Adlani's short four-month tenure had not been a smooth transition in city hall, according to sources. He rubbed a number of staff members the wrong way, and there was growing dissatisfaction among

some councilmembers as well.

As for the reason for his firing, the council did not include one in its resolution to fire him. The city manager was hired as an "at will" employee, meaning that, normally, a reason for firing isn't required to be given.

But Councilmember Hassan suggested that the reason for Al-Adlani's firing was because of various "violations" that were not specified.

Al-Adlani was hired after the council abruptly fired former city manager Max Garbarino last August. Garbarino has also filed

same attorney representing Garbarino (and former city clerk Rana Faraj, who was also fired after last November's election) to file his lawsuit as well.

As of now, Finance Director Syed Aamir Hassan is once again the acting city manager, a role he filled after Garbarino was fired.

Al-Adlani's firing underscores a growing rift between the Bengali councilmembers and Mayor Alharbi, who is a Yemeni immigrant. That divide now seems threatening to blow open into a full-on civil war.

County health agency celebrates two-year anniversary

The Detroit Wayne Integrated Health Network (DWIHN) recently celebrated an anniversary for its crisis center.

The county health agency's 707 Crisis Center, located in Detroit, is now in its second year.

Over the past year, almost 3,400 people were treated – a huge increase from the previous year.

"Our Crisis Care Services team continues to shine a light for those dealing with dark times in their lives," said James E. White, DWIHN President and CEO. "707 Crisis Care Center is truly a beacon for the region."

In its first year, the 707 Crisis Care Center served over 2,380 guests. In the same year, the facility received the Gold Seal of Approval from the Joint Commission, a testament to quality performance standards.

More recently, 707 was recognized with the National Alliance on Mental Illness Michigan Honors Award for the Best Hospital/Managed Care Organization for 2026.

"We are committed to

making a difference in the lives of our guests," said Grace Wolf, DWIHN Vice President of Crisis Services.

The first of its kind facility in the State, the Center is in the heart of Detroit providing direct specialized care for individuals in crisis, and easing the burden on local first responder agencies, which are not always equipped to offer appropriate mental health support.

The Center offers person-focused services for crisis calls and walk-ins 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, all the under one roof; from Crisis Walk-In and Adult Crisis Stabilization to Youth and Family Crisis Unit, and a special peer-led program called B.E.S.T (Building Empowered Supportive Transition) Unit, which is setting a new standard in

the industry.

This year, DWIHN added Behavioral Health Urgent Care to address acute needs within the facility as well as for walk-ins. For the year, the Center has admitted 129 guests for the B.E.S.T. Unit, while 308 received treatment in its Behavioral Health Urgent Care.

"We are proud to be a resource and refuge for those struggling in the lowest points of their lives. We're here when you need us most, 24/7/365," said White.

The 707 Crisis Care Center evaluates adults and adolescents in behavioral health crises to determine their medical necessity for crisis-level services. It offers 32 beds to DWIHN's Crisis Continuum of Care for individuals needing help.

It's the last name on that list that got recognized this time, on June 4, when a large banner was hung to honor Ike Blessitt on the fence at his old high school field.

"Ike hit many baseballs over this fence in the 1960s," posted Tom Derry of the Hamtramck Stadium Grounds Crew.

Blessitt, 76, still pops into town occasionally, despite having lost a leg

to diabetes a while back.

He was a Hamtramck High School star in the 60s, ended up getting drafted by the Tigers, and though his pro career was short indeed – five games, five total at-bats, no hits – he is remembered as one who made it, who "broke through," something so few will ever manage to do.

He ended up spending many years playing ball in Mexico, and stays active running a hitting clinic for the young could-be stars of tomorrow.

Present for the banner ceremony, among others, were Grounds Crew members Tom Derry, Roy Jeffery, and Dan Theriault, as well as Hamtramck Stadium Director of Operations Mike Wilson.

SUPPLEMENTAL BOND RESOLUTION TO AUTHORIZE ISSUANCE OF ADDITIONAL WATER SUPPLY AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS

Minutes of a regular meeting of the City Council of the City of Hamtramck, Wayne County, Michigan, held in the City Hall, 3401 Evaline Street, Hamtramck, Michigan, on June 9, 2026.

PRESENT: Choudhury, Musa, Sadman, Saed, Alsomiri, Hassan

ABSENT:

The following Resolution was offered by Member Choudhury and supported by Member Saed:

WHEREAS, by resolution adopted on May 26, 2015 (the "2015 Resolution"), the City Council (the "Council") of the City of Hamtramck, Wayne County, Michigan (the "City") authorized the issuance of its Water Supply and Sewage Disposal System Junior Lien Revenue Bonds, Series 2015 (Michigan State Revolving Fund Program) in the aggregate principal amount of not to exceed \$6,525,000 (the "Series 2015 Bonds") under Act 94, Public Acts of Michigan, 1933, as amended ("Act 94"), to finance sewage disposal infrastructure improvements to the City's water supply and sewage disposal system (the "System," as further defined in the Resolution); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the 2015 Resolution, the Series 2015 Bonds were issued on September 17, 2015 and remain outstanding in the aggregate principal amount of \$3,665,000; and

WHEREAS, by supplemental resolution adopted on June 11, 2019 (the "2019 Resolution"), the Council authorized the issuance of its Water Supply System Junior Lien Revenue Bonds, Series 2019 in the aggregate principal amount of not to exceed \$1,100,000 (the "Series 2019 Bonds") under Act 94 to finance water supply infrastructure improvements to the System; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Resolution, the Series 2019 Bonds were issued on August 30, 2019 and remain outstanding in the aggregate principal amount of \$455,000; and

WHEREAS, by supplemental resolution adopted on February 22, 2022 (the "2022 Resolution" and together with the 2015 Resolution, and the 2019 Resolution, the "Resolution"), the Council authorized the issuance of its Water Supply System Junior Lien Revenue Bonds, Series 2022 in one or more series in the aggregate principal amount of not to exceed \$9,500,000 (the "Series 2022 Bonds") under Act 94 to finance water supply infrastructure improvements to the System; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Resolution, the City issued its Water Supply System Junior Lien Revenue Bonds, Series 2022A on May 6, 2022 (the "Series 2022A Bonds"), which Series 2022A Bonds remain outstanding in the aggregate principal amount of \$480,000; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Resolution, the City issued its Water Supply System Junior Lien Revenue Bonds, Series 2022B on September 20, 2022 (the "Series 2022B Bonds" together with the Series 2022A Bonds, the "Series 2022 Bonds"), which remain outstanding in the aggregate principal amount of \$1,870,000; and

WHEREAS, the Resolution authorizes the issuance of Additional Junior Lien Bonds (as defined therein) of equal standing with the Series 2015 Bonds, the Series 2019 Bonds, and the Series 2022 Bonds for, among other things, the acquisition and construction of repairs, enlargements, extensions, additions and improvements to the System in the discretion of the City; and

WHEREAS, the only Junior Lien Bonds (as defined in the Resolution) outstanding on the date hereof under the Resolution are the Series 2015 Bonds, the Series 2019 Bonds, and the Series 2022 Bonds; and

WHEREAS, this Council does hereby determine that it is necessary to design, purchase, acquire and construct additional water supply infrastructure improvements to the System, including, but not limited to, removal, replacement, and installation of water service lines in portions of the City to comply with the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy's Lead and Copper Rules, acquisition and construction of any related appurtenances and facilities, as well as all work necessary and incidental to these improvements, including without limitation the restoration of property, streets, rights-of-way, and easements affected by the improvements (the "Improvements"); and

WHEREAS, the aggregate cost of designing, purchasing, acquiring and constructing the Improvements is estimated to be not less than \$5,650,000; and

WHEREAS, the City wishes to supplement

the Resolution at this time and to authorize the issuance of one or more series of Additional Junior Lien Bonds to defray the eligible costs of designing, purchasing, acquiring and constructing the Improvements, and to sell such Additional Junior Lien Bonds in one or more private negotiated sales to the Michigan Finance Authority (the "Authority") as authorized by Act 227, Public Acts of Michigan, 1985, as amended ("Act 227"), in order to enable the Authority to provide assistance with respect to the Improvements from the proceeds of the Drinking Water State Revolving Fund (the "Program").

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of

Hamtramck, Wayne County, Michigan, as follows:

Section 1. 2026 SUPPLEMENTAL RESOLUTION. This resolution (hereinafter referred to as the "2026 Supplemental Resolution") is adopted in accordance with Section 22 of the Resolution and pursuant to the authority in Act 94.

Section 2. DEFINITIONS. Except as provided in the preambles hereto and except as hereinafter provided, all terms which are defined in Section 1 of the Resolution shall have the same meanings in this 2026 Supplemental Resolution. In addition, the following terms shall have the following meanings in this 2026 Supplemental Resolution:

(a) "Authorized Officer" means the Mayor, City Manager, or Controller of the City, or any one or more of them.

(b) "Issue Date" means the date on which the Series 2026 Bonds are delivered to the original purchaser thereof.

(c) "Contract Documents" means the Purchase Contract between the City and the Authority, the Supplemental Agreement by and among the City, the Authority and the State of Michigan acting through the Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy, and the Issuer's Certificate for the Series 2026 Bonds, or such other closing documents required by the Authority for the issuance of the Series 2026 Bonds.

(d) "Series 2026 Bonds" means the Bonds authorized in Sections 5 and 6.

Section 3. NECESSITY, PUBLIC PURPOSE. It is hereby determined to be necessary for the public health, safety and welfare of the City to acquire and construct the Improvements in accordance with the maps, plans and specifications therefor prepared by Hennessey Engineers, which are hereby approved.

Section 4. ESTIMATED COST; PERIOD OF USEFULNESS. The cost of the

Improvements has been estimated by the engineers to be not less than \$5,650,000, including the payment of eligible legal, engineering, financial and other expenses, which estimate of cost is approved and confirmed, and the period of usefulness of the Improvements is estimated to be greater than forty (40) years.

Section 5. ISSUANCE OF BONDS. To pay all or a portion of the eligible costs of designing, purchasing, acquiring, and constructing the Improvements and to pay the eligible legal and financial expenses and all other eligible expenses incidental to the issuance of the Series 2026 Bonds, the City shall borrow the aggregate principal sum of not to exceed \$5,650,000 and issue its revenue bonds pursuant to the provisions of the Act. The Series 2026 Bonds shall be issued in one or more series of bonds in the aggregate principal sum of not to exceed \$5,650,000, as finally determined by the Authorized Officer by written order or other document as authorized pursuant to this 2026 Supplemental Resolution, or such lesser amount thereof as shall have been advanced to the City pursuant to the Contract Documents.

During the time funds are being drawn down by the City under the Series 2026 Bonds, the Authority will periodically provide the City a statement showing the amount of principal that has been advanced and the date of each advance, which statement shall constitute prima facie evidence of the reported information; provided that no failure on the part of the Authority to provide such a statement or to reflect a disbursement or the correct amount of a disbursement shall relieve the City of its obligation to repay the outstanding principal amount actually advanced, all accrued interest thereon, and any other amount payable with respect thereto in accordance with the terms of the Series 2026 Bonds.

Section 6. SERIES 2026 BOND TERMS. The Series 2026 Bonds shall be designated "Water Supply System Junior Lien Revenue Bonds" with such appropriate series designation as is determined by the Authorized Officer. The Se-

ries 2026 Bonds shall be issued as one or more fully registered manuscript bonds, shall be sold and delivered to the Authority in any denomination. The Series 2026 Bonds shall be dated the date of delivery to the Authority, or such other date approved by the Authorized Officer, and shall be payable on the dates determined by the Authorized Officer at the time of sale provided the final maturity shall be no later than forty (40) years after the date of issuance. The Series 2026 Bonds shall bear interest at a rate of not to exceed 3.00% per annum as determined by the Authorized Officer, payable semiannually on the dates determined by the Authorized Officer at the time of sale.

Notwithstanding the above, the final amount of any maturity and terms of the Series 2026 Bonds shall be as provided in the Contract Documents and will be finally determined by the Authorized Officer.

Section 7. PAYMENT OF SERIES 2026 BONDS; CONFIRMATION OF STATUTORY LIEN. The principal of, premium, if any, and interest on the Series 2026 Bonds shall be payable solely from the Net Revenues, and, to secure such payment from the Net Revenues, the statutory lien upon the whole of the Net Revenues established by Act 94 and the pledge created in Section 6 of the Resolution is hereby confirmed in favor of the Series 2026 Bonds as follows: such lien shall be a second lien of equal standing and priority with the Series 2015 Bonds, the Series 2019 Bonds, and the Series 2022 Bonds, but junior and subordinate to the lien of all to be issued First Lien Bonds.

The Series 2026 Bonds, including both principal and interest thereon, shall not be a general obligation of the City and shall not constitute an indebtedness of the City for the purpose of any debt limitations imposed by any constitutional or statutory provisions.

Section 8. PRIOR REDEMPTION. The Series 2026 Bonds issued and sold to the Authority shall be subject to redemption prior to maturity upon the terms and conditions set forth in the form of Series 2026 Bonds contained in Section 11 hereof.

Section 9. PAYING AGENT AND REGISTRATION.

(a) Appointment of Paying Agent. From time to time the Authorized Officer shall designate and appoint a Paying Agent, which shall also act as transfer agent and bond registrar. The initial Paying Agent shall be the City Treasurer. In the event of a change in the Paying Agent, notice shall be given in writing, by certified mail, to each Registered Owner not less than sixty (60) days prior to the next interest payment date. The Paying Agent shall keep the official books for the recordation of the Registered Owners of the Bonds.

(b) Registration of Bonds. Registration of the Bonds shall be recorded in the registration books of the City to be kept by a Paying Agent. Bonds may be transferred only by submitting the same, together with a satisfactory instrument of transfer signed by the Registered Owner or the Registered Owner's legal representative duly authorized in writing, to the Paying Agent, after which a new Bond or Bonds shall be issued by the Paying Agent to the transferee (new registered owner) in any denomination, in the same aggregate principal amount as the Bond submitted for transfer. No transfer of Bonds shall be valid unless and until recorded on the bond registration books in accordance with the foregoing. The person in whose name any Bond is registered may for all purposes, notwithstanding any notice to the contrary, be deemed and treated by the City and the Paying Agent as the absolute owner thereof, and any payment of principal and interest on any Bond to the Registered Owner thereof shall constitute a valid discharge of the City's liability upon such Bond to the extent of such payment. No Bond shall be transferred less than fifteen (15) days prior to an interest payment date nor after the Bond has been called for redemption.

(c) Authority's Depository. Notwithstanding any other provision of the Resolution, this 2026 Supplemental Resolution or the Series 2026 Bonds, so long as the Authority is the owner of the Series 2026 Bonds: (a) the Series 2026 Bonds shall be payable in lawful money of the United States; (b) the Series 2026 Bonds are payable as to principal, premium, if any, and interest at U.S. Bank Trust Company, National Association, or at such other place as shall be designated in writing to the City by the Authority (the "Authority's Depository"); (c) the City agrees that it will deposit with the Authority's Depository payments of the principal of, pre-

mium, if any, and interest on the Series 2026 Bonds in immediately available funds by 12:00 p.m. (noon) at least five business days prior to the date on which any such payment is due whether by maturity, redemption or otherwise; in the event that the Authority's Depository has not received the City's deposit by 12:00 p.m. (noon) on the scheduled day, the City shall immediately pay to the Authority as invoiced by the Authority an amount to recover the Authority's administrative costs and lost investment earnings attributable to that late payment; and (d) written notice of any redemption of the Series 2026 Bonds shall be given by the City and received by the Authority's Depository at least 40 days prior to the date on which such redemption is to be made.

Section 10. SALE OF BONDS. The Series 2026 Bonds shall be sold to the Authority. The City determines that a negotiated sale to the Authority is in the best interest of the City because the terms offered by the Authority are more favorable than those available from other sources of funding.

Section 11. BOND FORM. The Series 2026 Bonds shall be in substantially the following form with such completions, changes and additions as may be required by the Authority or as recommended by the City's Bond Counsel and approved by the officers of the City signing the Series 2026 Bonds, whose manual or facsimile signatures thereon shall be conclusive evidence of the approval thereof:

This Bond, being one fully registered manuscript bond, is issued in accordance with the provisions of Act 94, Public Acts of Michigan, 1933, as amended and a resolution adopted by the City Council of the Issuer on May 26, 2015, as supplemented on June 11, 2019, February 22, 2022, and June 9, 2026 (as supplemented, the "Resolution"), for the purpose of paying the cost of acquiring and constructing improvements to the System. This Bond is a selfliquidating Bond and is not a general obligation of the Issuer within any constitutional, statutory or charter limitation, but is payable, both as to principal and interest, solely from the Net Revenues of the System. The principal of and interest on this Bond are secured by a statutory lien on the Net Revenues.

The Issuer hereby covenants and agrees to fix, and maintain at all times while any of the Bonds shall be outstanding, such rates for service furnished by the System as shall be sufficient to provide for payment of the principal of and interest upon all such Bonds as and when the same become due and payable, to maintain a bond and interest redemption account and to provide for the payment of expenses of administration and operation and such expenses for maintenance of the System as are necessary to preserve the same in good repair and working order, and to provide for such other expenditures and funds for the System as are required by the Resolution. Bonds of this series may be subject to redemption prior to maturity by the Issuer only with the prior written consent of the Authority and on such terms as may be required by the Authority.

In the event of a default in the payment of principal or interest hereon when due, whether at maturity, by redemption or otherwise, the amount of such default shall bear interest (the "additional interest") at a rate equal to the rate of interest that is two percent above the Authority's cost of providing funds (as determined by the Authority) to make payment on the bonds of the Authority issued to provide funds to purchase this Bond but in no event in excess of the maximum rate of interest permitted by law. The additional interest shall continue to accrue until the Authority has been fully reimbursed for all costs incurred by the Authority (as determined by the Authority) as a consequence of the Issuer's default. Such additional interest shall be payable on the interest payment date following demand of the Authority. In the event that (for reasons other than the default in the payment of any municipal obligation purchased by the Authority) the investment of amounts in the reserve account established by the Authority for the bonds of the Authority issued to provided funds to purchase this Bond fails to provide sufficient available funds (together with any other funds that may be made available for such purpose) to pay the interest on outstanding bonds of the Authority issued to fund such account, the Is-

suer shall and hereby agrees to pay on demand only the Issuer's pro rata share (as determined by the Authority) of such deficiency as additional interest on this Bond.

It is hereby certified and recited that all acts, conditions and things required by law, precedent to and in the issuance of this Bond, exist and have been done and performed in regular and due time and form as required by law and that the total indebtedness of the Issuer including this Bond, does not exceed any charter, constitutional or statutory limitation.

Section 12. SALE, ISSUANCE, DELIVERY, TRANSFER AND EXCHANGE OF SERIES 2026 BONDS. Each series of the Series 2026 Bonds shall be sold at a private, negotiated sale to the Authority, as authorized by Act 227. The Council determines that the sale and delivery of each series of the Series 2026 Bonds to the Authority

as provided in this 2026 Supplemental Resolution will provide the City with the lowest cost of borrowing money for the

Improvements. Each sale shall be made pursuant to the terms and conditions to be set forth in a Purchase Contract (the "Purchase Contract") and a Supplemental Agreement (the "Supplemental Agreement") related to such series. The Authorized Officer is authorized to execute and deliver each Supplemental Agreement and each Purchase Contract in such forms as shall be approved by the Authorized Officer, with such approval to be evidenced by the Authorized Officer's signature thereon. Notwithstanding any other provision of this 2026 Supplemental Resolution, each series of the Series 2026 Bonds shall be initially sold to the Authority as one bond, numbered 1, in the aggregate principal amount of not to exceed \$5,650,000. In addition, the Authorized Officer and other City employees and officials are authorized to execute and deliver to the Authority and such certificates and documents as the Authority or bond counsel shall require and to do all other things necessary to effectuate the sale, issuance, delivery, transfer and exchange of each series of the Series 2026 Bonds in accordance with the provisions of this 2026 Supplemental Resolution. The Authorized Officer is authorized to execute any orders, receipts, agreements, pledge agreements, documents or certificates necessary to complete a transaction authorized pursuant to this 2026 Supplemental Resolution, including, but not limited to, any issuers certificate, any certificates relating to federal or state securities laws, rules or regulations, and any revenue sharing pledge agreement. The Authorized Officer is authorized to seek a credit assessment, or similar, from a nationally recognized statistical rating organization and to execute and file any applications to the Michigan Department of Treasury, including an Application for State Treasurer's Approval to Issue Long-Term Securities and any other applications to the Michigan Department of Treasury and to seek any waivers from the Michigan Department of Treasury.

Section 13. TAX COVENANT. The City covenants to comply with all requirements of the Code necessary to assure that the interest on such Series 2026 Bonds will be and will remain excludable from gross income for federal income tax purposes. The Authorized Officer and other appropriate officials of the City are authorized to do all things necessary to assure that the interest on the Series 2026 Bonds will be and will remain excludable from gross income for federal income tax purposes.

Section 14. EXECUTION OF BONDS. The Mayor or the Mayor Pro Tem, and the Clerk or Deputy Clerk of the City, are hereby authorized and directed to sign the Series 2026 Bonds, either manually or by facsimile signature, on behalf of the City. Upon execution, the Series 2026 Bonds shall be delivered to the purchaser upon receipt of the purchase price or upon compliance with the terms and conditions of the related Purchase Contract.

Section 15. CONSTRUCTION FUND. The City Treasurer is hereby directed to create and maintain one or more construction funds for the Improvements (collectively, the "Construction Fund"), into which the proceeds of each series of the Series 2026 Bonds shall be deposited. Such moneys shall be used solely for the purpose for which the Series 2026 Bonds were issued. Any unexpected balance in the Construction Fund remaining after completion of the Improvements may be used for such purposes as allowed by law. After completion of the Improvements and disposition of remaining Series 2026 Bond proceeds, if any, pursuant to the provisions of this Section, the Construction Fund shall be closed.

Section 16. SERIES 2026 BOND PROCEEDS. The proceeds of the sale of the Series 2026 Bonds shall be used solely to pay the eligible costs of the Improvements and any eligible engineering, legal and other expenses incident thereto; provided that the City Council shall not authorize the payment of any such moneys for acquisition and construction of any part of the Improvements until there shall have been first filed with it by the consulting engineer in charge of such work, a written statement to the effect that the sum so to be paid is in full or partial payment of a contractual obligation in connection with the Improvements and that the City has received the consideration for such payment. The statement of the consulting engineer shall also show the cost of acquisition and construction of the Improvements that has heretofore been approved by him for payment and the amount of the balance that will be required for completion of the Improvements.

Section 17. DEFEASANCE. In the event cash or direct obligations of the United States or obligations the principal of and interest on which are guaranteed by the United States, or a com-

bination thereof, the principal of and interest on which, without reinvestment, come due at times and in amounts sufficient to pay at maturity or irrevocable call for earlier optional or mandatory redemption, the principal of, premium, if any, and interest on any of the Bonds, shall be deposited in trust, this 2026 Supplemental Resolution shall be defeased with respect to such Bonds (the "Defeased Bonds"), and the owners of the Defeased Bonds shall have no further rights under this 2026 Supplemental Resolution except to receive payment of the principal of, premium, if any, and interest on the bonds from the cash or securities deposited in trust and the interest and gains thereon and to transfer and exchange bonds as provided herein. Defeased Bonds shall be treated as if they have been redeemed for all purposes under the Resolution and this 2026 Supplemental Resolution.

Section 18. CONTRACT WITH BONDHOLDERS. The provisions of this 2026 Supplemental Resolution shall constitute a contract between the City and the Bondholders from time to time, and after the issuance of any of such Bonds, no change, variation or alteration of the provisions of this 2026 Supplemental Resolution may be made that would lessen the security for the Series 2026 Bonds. The provisions of this 2026 Supplemental Resolution shall be enforceable by appropriate proceedings taken by such Bondholder, either at law or in equity.

Section 19. STATE REVENUE SHARING PLEDGE. If required by the Authority, as additional security for repayment of the Series 2026 Bonds, the City Council agrees to pledge the state revenue sharing payments that the City is eligible to receive from the State of Michigan under Act 140, Public Acts of Michigan, 1971, as amended, to the Authority as purchaser and holder of the Series 2026 Bonds. The Authorized Officer is authorized to execute and deliver a revenue sharing pledge agreement between the City and the Authority.

Section 20. PUBLICATION AND RECORDATION. This 2026 Supplemental Resolution shall be published once in full in a newspaper of general circulation in the City qualified under state law to publish legal notices, and the same shall be recorded in the records of the City and such recording authenticated by the signature of the City Clerk.

Section 21. RESOLUTION SUBJECT TO MICHIGAN LAW. The provisions of this

2026 Supplemental Resolution are subject to the laws of the State of Michigan.

Section 22. SECTION HEADINGS. The section headings in this 2026 Supplemental Resolution are furnished for convenience of reference only and shall not be considered to be a part of this 2026 Supplemental Resolution.

Section 23. SEVERABILITY. If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this 2026 Supplemental Resolution shall be held invalid, the invalidity of such section, paragraph, clause or provision shall not affect any of the other provisions of this 2026 Supplemental Resolution.

Section 24. RATIFICATION OF RESOLUTION; CONFLICTING RESOLUTIONS. The 2015 Resolution, as supplemented by the 2019 Supplemental Resolution, the 2022 Supplemental Resolution, and this 2026 Supplemental Resolution, is hereby ratified and confirmed. All resolutions or parts thereof, insofar as the same may be in conflict herewith, are hereby repealed to the extent of the conflict; provided, that the foregoing shall not operate to repeal any provision thereof, the repeal of which would impair the obligation on the Series 2015 Bonds, the Series 2019 Bonds, the Series 2022 Bonds, or the Series 2026 Bonds.

Section 25. EFFECTIVE DATE OF RESOLUTION. Pursuant to Section 6 of the Act, this 2026 Supplemental Resolution shall be approved on the date of first reading and this 2026 Supplemental Resolution shall be effective immediately upon its adoption and publication pursuant to Act 94.

Message to the city ...

Former mayor Karen Majewski has a special plea for city officials. Here it is:

"We all love flowers, and appreciate any city-sponsored effort to attract economic development, so flower boxes on Jos. Campau are appreciated. (We've also had problems for decades with upkeep and watering of the flower boxes we already have – does anyone left in the decision-making process know that?)

"But if we're serious about attracting economic investment, let's address the elephants in the room:

"1. No one is going to lay down serious money when the city administration is in demonstrable, painfully public disarray. Investors want stability. We are a hot mess.

"2. Likewise, when major property owners are allowed to let their buildings sit vacant for YEARS, even DECADES, in the middle of our bu-

ness district, it creates not only blight but an impression that the city is deteriorating.

"The most notable culprits are Councilman Alsomiri with the former Shoppers World building; and Dennis Kafallinos, who owns the tallest commercial building in Hamtramck, at the corner of Belmont and Jos. Campau. Both of those men are doing significant – maybe irreversible – damage to redevelopment efforts in the city.

"Who is going to invest in our downtown when these prominent buildings are allowed to crumble in the very center of our commercial district?

"In the past, partly the culprit was an emergency manager who sniffed at putting safeguards in place. Once she was gone, some measures were taken to impose fines while working with the property owners.

"But how far along has

that gotten us?

"It's now 2026, with no significant changes in those properties in years. The city can choose to impose heavy, graduated fines for – and maybe even seize – those properties.

"Yes, that's the stick approach, but in these cases the carrot has gotten us blight and decay."

Reminder ... Time is running out.

Having trouble keeping up on paying off your delinquent property taxes owed to Wayne County?

Well, fret no more, because Wayne County Treasurer Eric Sabree has a financial plan for you, and he is urging property owners who are struggling to pay their delinquent property taxes to enroll in the Interest Reduction Stipulated Payment Agreement (IRSPA) plan by June 30, 2026.

IRSPA is a payment plan, designed specifically for owner-occupied properties, that significantly reduces the interest rate on delinquent taxes – from 18% to 6% – for eligible taxpayers.

"Without action by the Michigan Legislature before June 30, this vital payment plan will end this month," said Sabree. "So, we are urging Wayne County property owners who may be struggling to pay back taxes to enroll while they still can, before the Legislature puts an end to this program."

To qualify and sign up for the IRSPA plan, the property owner must live in the home as their principal residence and must have a Principal Residence Exemption (PRE) on file to prove permanent residency.

If the taxes are in a name other than the owner, a copy of the deed must be presented for proof of ownership. Through the IRSPA program, all past delinquencies can be conveniently bundled into one manageable payment plan, helping families keep their homes and get back on track with tax payments.

Eligible property owners are encouraged to enroll in this plan, and take advantage of this reduced interest rate, before the program ends on June 30, 2026.

If you lost your property to tax foreclosure in 2026:

You may be entitled to claim remaining proceeds from the sale associated with the parcel that exceeds the amount owed for taxes, interest and fees.



DEADLINE TO FILE A CLAIM: JULY 1, 2026

1 FILL OUT THE NOTICE OF INTENT FORM WITH THE FOLLOWING INFO: APPLICATION INFORMATION, PROPERTY INFORMATION, AND INTEREST IN PROPERTY (E.G. MORTGAGE AND LIEN HOLDERS).

2 NOTARIZE THE NOTICE OF INTENT FORM

3 SUBMIT THE NOTICE OF INTENT FORM TO THE WAYNE COUNTY TREASURER'S OFFICE VIA CERTIFIED MAIL OR IN PERSON: 400 MONROE ST, DETROIT, MI 48226

CLAIMS PROCESS - FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

What is the 2026 Auction Proceeds Claims Process?

If your property was foreclosed in March 2026, you may be owed money from the auction sale. This is called remaining proceeds—the extra money left after your taxes and fees were paid. Under Michigan Compiled Laws (MCL) 211.78t, this money is not sent automatically—you have to apply to get it.

Who is eligible to file a claim for remaining proceeds?

You may be entitled to any remaining proceeds from a foreclosure sale if you owned or had an ownership interest in a property in Wayne County, Michigan, that was foreclosed in 2026 and may be sold at auction. "Remaining proceeds" are proceeds from the auction sale left over, if any, after the total amount due to the foreclosing governmental unit (including all costs and expenses incurred in connection with the sale) is paid.

How do I Participate?

To be eligible to receive any remaining sale proceeds, you must submit a Notice of Intent to Claim Interest in Foreclosure Sales Proceeds (Form 5743) no later than July 1, 2026. Scan the QR code to access the form.

How do I Submit the Notice of Intent form?

The Completed and NOTARIZED forms must be sent by certified United States Postal Service mail, return receipt requested or hand delivered no later than July 1, 2026 to: Wayne County Treasurer: 400 Monroe, 5th Floor, Detroit, MI 48226

What are next steps after filing the Notice of the Intent form?

You will receive a Notice to Claimant to File Motion by January 30, 2027. This notice will include:

- Whether there are funds available (remaining proceeds)
- Whether other parties have filed claims
- Instructions to file a motion with the Wayne County 3rd Circuit Court
- Your case number, assigned judge, and court contact information
