significant social and political changes. Yet even during those challenging years, I discovered a nation filled with hope, possibility, and opportunity.

An America very different from today

When I arrived in America, there were no smartphones, no internet, no email, and no GPS. Long-distance telephone calls to India were expensive, and were reserved for emergencies or special occasions. Air mail letters often took weeks to arrive, and replies took weeks more to return.

America itself looked very different in 1971. Families gathered around television sets in the evenings to watch programs on a handful of channels. Department stores such as Sears, Montgomery Ward, Hudson’s, and Kmart were landmarks of American life. Many people worked in factories, offices, schools, hospitals, and small businesses.

The American automobile industry was among the strongest in the world, especially in Detroit where I eventually made my home.

Witnessing extraordinary change

During the past 55 years, I have had the privilege of witnessing extraordinary changes in this country. I have seen the arrival of personal computers, the internet, mobile phones, and now artificial intelligence.

I have watched America continue to explore space and push the boundaries

of science and technology. I have witnessed medical advances that have transformed healthcare and improved countless lives.

I have also seen America become increasingly diverse and multicultural. People from every nation, language, and culture have made this country their home. America has grown stronger because of the contributions of immigrants who brought with them their talents, hard work, faith, and dreams.

The blessing of opportunity

As an immigrant, I remain profoundly grateful for the opportunities America has provided for my family and me. This nation allowed me to pursue education, build a career, raise a family, and enjoy the blessings of freedom and security.

Like millions of immigrants before me, I discovered that America is more than a place on a map. America is an idea – a belief that through hard work, determination, faith, and perseverance, one can build a better future.

America’s journey over these 250 years has not

been without struggles.

The nation has endured wars, economic hardships, social challenges, and political divisions. Yet one of America’s greatest strengths has always been its ability to learn, adapt, and move forward with hope.

Honoring the builders of America

As America celebrates her 250th birthday, we honor the vision of the Founding Fathers, the courage of those who defended liberty, the dedication of workers who built the nation’s prosperity, and the contributions of immigrants who enriched the American story.

Today, under the leadership of President Donald Trump, a new generation of Americans is writing the next chapter of this remarkable nation. What the recreational tax renewal means for the community

There is a recreation millage renewal on the August Primary Election ballot here in the City of Hamtramck. The School District asks for a renewal every 10 years. It is \$3.93 for every \$1,000 of property value. This is not a new tax, it does not increase taxes. It is a renewal of the millage that is currently in place.

The current fund expires this year and a millage must be renewed to continue. Recreation funds are used for all ages and stages of life here in Hamtramck. Residents benefit from lows cost or free programming for the entire community.

There are free community events for the entire population. Our parks and green spaces can also be maintained with recreation funds. These provide a safe environment for residents and guests and

for youth enrichment.

There are programs such as summer camp, karate, soccer, baseball, cricket, basketball and dance for our youth. There are adult fitness and sports leagues. Recreation maintains a pool at Hamtramck High School that has open swim, swim lessons and water aerobics.

The community center has a weight room, sauna, basketball courts and fitness classes. This is also where indoor sports are played for our school teams.

Recreation provides senior programs such as field trips and tailored fitness classes. Recreation also provides special events like Movies in the Park, Fall Harvest, Parent and Me dances, Snowfest, and the popular “Trunk or Treat” before Halloween.

The Recreation fund also maintains city properties such as Pulaski

Park and Karpinski Park, with play structures and splash pads. There are parks at Early Childhood, Kosciuszko, Dickinson East and Holbrook Schools. There is a large play structure at Veterans Park, as well as plenty of green space for residents.

The Millage proposal is on the August 4, 2026 ballot and absentee ballots were recently mailed out. Early voting is at Hamtramck City Hall from now through Aug. 2.

Again: the millage is a renewal at the current rate of 3.93 mills (\$3.93 per \$1,000 of assessed value). It is a renewal of the current millage and does not raise taxes. Polls are open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. on Aug. 4.

Fireworks season is here and some residents aren’t celebrating

Brace yourselves.

As many residents are keenly aware, this Fourth of July offers a number of festivities in the metro area – including fireworks.

And, by fireworks, we mean all sorts – including ones that sound like they came from military arsenals – in Hamtramck’s neighborhoods.

As usual, a number of residents are not pleased with the incessant fireworks going off at any and all times of the year.

Hamtramck police are reminding residents that fireworks displays are legal in Michigan, and there is little the city can do to prevent the practice.

The Fourth of July fireworks season here for residents started officially on June 29, as allowed by state law, and goes through July 4, but only until 11:45 p.m. on each day.

Yes, we know, those hours are treated as

mere suggestions here in town.

Also, minors cannot possess or use fireworks, and it’s illegal to sell or provide fireworks to anyone under the age of 18.

And once again, we know this is routinely ignored in town.

The police department says there will be stepped-up patrols, but the department also acknowledges that it’s impossible for them to be everywhere at once.

On social media, the keyboard warriors were up in arms – complaining about their pets being frightened, or concerned over the city’s houses being mostly wood frames and too close together – posing a special fire hazard potential.

Marty Shockman, a well-known electrician in town, focused his complaint about fireworks use on the danger they pose to Hamtramck houses.

“You’re allowing this in

a city with all wood-frame houses that are 100 years old or more, and on every block I’ve driven down in the last three weeks has two or more fire hydrants that are tagged out of service, and no one is repairing them. Seriously?” he said.

Lynette Marie said the city wasn’t always this – er, festive – years ago.

“When I was a kid, fireworks in Hamtramck were one day, on the 4th, at Pulaski Park, controlled by adults only,” Marie said. “For Hamtramck to allow the free-for-all, all year long, as it does, is ridiculous!”

Technically, the city does not allow fireworks all year-round, but there are a number of holidays – both religious and secular – when the city allows fireworks to be shot off.

State law allows communities to expand fireworks use.

Odds & Ends

Condolences ... Mayor Adam Alharbi recently shared some heartbreaking news about his 7-year-old nephew.

The child, who lives in upstate New York, went missing for a few days. Tragically, he was found deceased.

On his Facebook page, Alharbi had this message: “We are devastated to share that he has been found deceased. Thank you to everyone who helped in the search.”

Victory ... Hamtramck seems to attract any number of lawsuits, some of which, one could say, are self-inflicted.

But in a trip-and-fall injury case, the city came out victorious.

We’ll let City Attorney Odey Meroueh, who issued a press release, explain the facts of the case: “The City of Hamtramck has been dismissed, with prejudice, from a personal injury lawsuit arising out of a claimed trip and fall near Keyworth Stadium.

“The plaintiff, Bradley Patterson, filed suit in Wayne County Circuit Court alleging that he fell on a metal plate and uneven surface near the stadium in April 2025. He claimed a fractured right femur and hip, and sought \$250,000 in non-economic damages along with medical expenses.

“The City’s defense established, through a professional survey, that the location where Mr. Patterson claimed to have fallen was not City property.

“On June 25, 2026, the Honorable Susan L. Hubbard signed a stipulated order dismissing the city with prejudice, and without any costs, interest, or attorney fees to any party. A dismissal with prejudice is final, and bars the plaintiff from bringing these claims against the City again.”

As for the city’s victory, Meroueh had this to say: “This is the right result for Hamtramck and for our taxpayers. The facts showed the city had no responsibility for the area in question, and we were able to bring this to a clean and complete resolution for the City at no cost to our residents.”

A word from our state senator ... Sen. Stephanie Chang (D-Detroit), whose district includes Hamtramck, was pleased about a recent U.S. Supreme Court decision that upheld the Constitution’s right for those born on American soil to instantly become U.S. citizens.

On the first day of President Trump’s second term, he issued an executive order barring that longstanding right – even though his own children were born here to mothers who were not citizens.

Here’s what Chang had to say in an email blast: “As a proud daughter of immigrants, I am pleased with today’s (June 30) United States Supreme Court decision in preserving the right to birthright citizenship, a basic American promise that was upheld more than a century ago in U.S. v. Wong Kim Ark.

“The Constitution is clear that ‘all persons born or naturalized in the United States and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the State wherein they reside’. ...

“We must all continue to defend core American values and ideas –including rights and dignity for immigrant and refugee communities. From elected leaders to community organizations and advocates, we must keep working to advance the promise of America and values of opportunity, justice and access.”

Hamtramck, as many know, has long been home to immigrants who are on track to become citizens and had children born here. We’re sure this is reassuring news to many in Hamtramck.

And just in case you were wondering, the U.S. is not the only country

that grants automatic citizenship to children whose parent or parents were not citizens.

There are about three dozen countries that grant the same right, which include our neighbors, Canada and Mexico.

Wrap your head around this... Hamtramck’s Historic Baseball Stadium is about to host something completely different.

This weekend, Friday from 4-10 p.m. and Saturday from 2-10 p.m., there will be something called Art Wraps 2026.

Part concert, part art installation, this is their fifth year of doing it, and there’s going to be a lot to hear and see for sure.

Friday’s show is being hosted by Axl Urameshi & Bria, and will feature some 15 bands, rappers, DJ’s, and performance artists.

Scheduled are Weirdoz Gang, Count Mack, Dusty Fingerz, Dane Doperock, Deastro, The Sad Hour, Dave Fio, Vampire Cowgirl, Nauseous, Valeri Woodall, Permanently Pissed, Elysium Night, Aubie Tarantino, DJ Chirish and 53X.

Saturday’s longer day is being hosted by Tru Klasick & Amber George, and will feature performances by: Oba Rowland, Dyrko, Lokye, Di Spinn, Whitney Waz, Dango Forlaine, Dnoe Larrair & Bread Boyz, Teddy (Censored) and the (Censored) Boys, Martez Claybren, Frostisrad, Wuzee, Heavenly Jones and DJ Deadphone.
